

## **Burial Record Book - General**

### **September 1856.**

First Ground broken for Southwestern Railway at Northcote Farm nr Honiton.

### **Sept. 20<sup>th</sup> 1854**

Battle of the Alma.

Glorious Victory over the Russians after a fierce Struggle – Crimea.

### **November 5<sup>th</sup> 1854**

Bloody Battle of Inkerman before Sebastopol in the Crimea & Glorious Victory. 15,000 Russians killed & Wounded. Our Loss, 43 Officers killed, 102 Wounded, & nearly 3000 Rank & File killed & wounded.

### **October 6<sup>th</sup> 1863 at 3h 25m.**

A violent Shock of an Earthquake was felt throughout England. Bells rang at Hembury Fort. Beds were as it were reared up Like a Mare or as if some Large Beast had got under the Bed & was stirring to rise up. Doors opened and Walls trembled.

### **May 1923**

The bells of the Church were this month re-opened after re-hanging, & entire repair at cost of £150. A large body of ringers from the district took part.

### **1949**

Two returned & recast. Treble added. Dedicated April 9<sup>th</sup> 1949 by the Bishop of Crediton.

### **July 24<sup>th</sup> 1927**

### **Feb 1930:**

The work cost me £198 – the Cottages were bought in 1903 by the Ecc<sup>o</sup> Commissioners & the Incumbent could receive the rent of the same – All the rents which had been taken up to 1909 - by Mr. Fulford who was here for months for repairs.
